### Annual Kernersville Good Friday Cross Walk


Sponsored by the Kernersville Christian Ministers Fellowship

The Kernersville Cross Walk will be on Good Friday, March 29. At 11:30am, we will gather in what is now the old Food Lion parking lot at 617 North Main Street. By Noon, we will have issued instructions, shared scripture, joined in prayer and started the walk escorted by our local police. Along with the large cross which we will share carrying, there will be a limited supply (100) of smaller, handheld wooden crosses for participants to carry. As we proceed, we will walk in silence through the downtown area and finish at Mt. Gur Cemetery with a few minutes of reflection. The 1.5 mile walk usually takes about 45 minutes to complete. The walk will occur rain or shine, so please dress accordingly. To avoid liability issues, please refrain from bringing your animals to the walk. This will be a powerful experience as we remember the crucifixion of Christ and we hope you will choose to participate!

### General Conference for the United Methodist Church

General Conference is the top policy-making body of The UMC. The conference meets to consider revisions to church law and to adopt resolutions on current moral, social, public policy, and economic issues. General Conference also approves plans and budgets for churchwide agencies and programs. The 2024 General Conference is just weeks away. The last time General Conference met in regular session was nearly eight years ago. The upcoming legislative assembly is scheduled for April 23-May 3 in Charlotte, NC.

General Conference is the only body that can speak for the whole United Methodist Church. It has the authority to make revisions to our denomination's Book of Discipline and Book of Resolutions. General Conference brings together lay and clergy delegates from four continents whose decisions will affect how millions of United Methodists do church for years to come.

Our Western NC Conference has the unique opportunity to host this session of General Conference and volunteers are needed in many areas. ## Why do we use different colors for the altar cloths and pastors' stoles during the year?

The table linens and cloth hangings on the altar and pulpit are called paraments. The colors of the paraments and the pastors' stoles reflect the traditional colors of the seasons of the Christian year.

### COLORS FOR THE CHRISTIAN YEAR

The Christian year contains two cycles: the Christmas Cycle (Advent–Christmas–Epiphany) and the Easter Cycle (Lent–Easter–Pentecost). Within each cycle are a preparatory season symbolized by the color purple and a festival season symbolized by the color white. After each cycle there is an ordinary time of growth symbolized by the color green. Thus there is a sequence of seasons using purple, white, and green in that order twice each year.

Purple is a color of both penitence and royalty used during the preparatory seasons of Advent and Lent. Blue, a color of hope, may also be used during Advent. Main Street UMC uses Blue during Advent and Purple during Lent.


White and gold are joyous and festive colors used during the Christmas and Easter Seasons and in other seasons on festive days such as Baptism of the Lord, Transfiguration, Trinity, All Saints, and Christ the King. White may also be used at weddings and at services where the Sacrament of Baptism is central. White is recommended at services of death and resurrection because it symbolizes both death and resurrection. At services of Holy Communion, white linens on top of the Lord's table are customary.

Green is a color of growth, and is used in the Seasons After the Epiphany and After Pentecost, except when special days call for white or red.

Red is a color of fire, symbolizing the Holy Spirit. It is used on the Day of Pentecost and at other times when the work of the Holy Spirit is emphasized. Red is also the color of blood—the blood of Christ and the blood of martyrs. It is appropriate for evangelistic services, for ordinations and consecrations, for church anniversaries and homecomings, and for civil observances.


Although use of these colors is based on broad ecumenical tradition, other colors have been and are being used in Christian churches. Creativity with colors and other signs for days and seasons is encouraged.

### NEWS FROM THE TRUSTEE COMMITTEE

Trustees is a working committee that is entrusted with taking care of our large church campus. This entails many different moving parts (electrical and plumbing issues, heating & air concerns, roof leaks, kitchen equipment failures, painting, carpeting, parsonage, campus usage and landscaping to name a few). It takes more than a Trustee Committee to maintain our facilities. It takes a team of many volunteers providing countless hours of volunteer labor and knowledge to maintain this fantastic facility that we call MSUMC.

One project that has been in the works for over 10 years is the reupholstering of the church pews in our Sanctuary. In many areas of the Sanctuary the fabric is dry rotted; exposing yellow seating foam in the pew seats. The time is now to complete this project to protect the integrity and beauty of our sanctuary. One factor has stopped this project in the past. How do we pay for it?

A few weeks ago, the Trustee Committee started a word-of-mouth campaign to solicit seed money for this project to supplement our 2024 budget. The Trustee Committee is asking for your financial support to restore our sanctuary seating area. The cost of the project breaks down to roughly \$700 a pew or \$65 a seat. One option will be money trees in the Commons area to pull an envelope for a recommended donation amount. There are 100 envelopes per tree with a dollar amount from \$1 to \$100. The minimum donation would be \$1 and the maximum donation would be \$100. Just pull your envelope and drop your matching donation in the offering plate or drop it by the Church Office. Pull as many envelopes as you like. Jan Hampton has appropriately named the campaign "Put your money where you seat is". Please prayerfully consider your gift. If you have already contributed to this cause The Trustee Committee warmly thanks you.

### Kairos Thanks You!!!

The Kairos team would like to thank you for your devoted prayers and generous donations toward the Kairos Prison Ministry earlier this month. We served 41 residents of Central Prison with meals from the outside, and contributed to over 4,000 prayer chain links which were strung out all over the meeting room (gymnasium) walls. We were absolutely caught by surprise by the amount of people who took an interest in this ministry.

One quick story... Kairos has had a presence at Central Prison (CP) since 1995. When COVID hit in 2019, they had to shut down the program for obvious reasons. It was rejuvenated in the summer of 2022, when it was considered safe for volunteers to reenter. During those COVID years, the residents continued with Bible Studies, that are still going on today. Other residents have been transferred out of CP and on to other prisons, and several of THOSE men have started Bible Studies in their new prison locations!

We praise God for His presence within the prison system and the realization of His presence in the lives of these men. May God richly bless all of you who came to prison with us by your commitment to pray and your financial assistance.

As a reminder we have changed how we communicate our financial status to better reflect income versus actual expenses rather than income versus budget so I'd like to explain the numbers shown on the bottom of page 11. Numbers are based on January & February combined. As of February, contributions were \$157,555 with actual expenses \$170,551 for a difference of \$-12,996. We spent a portion of our operating reserve just to cover expenses and no budgeted missions or connectional payments were able to be made in February. On a positive note, our building fund giving through the

first two months is in good shape largely due to a very generous contribution. Building fund giving through February was \$36,919 with loan payments of \$24,000, resulting in \$12,919 left over for future payments. We thank everyone that contributed to Main Street's ministries!
